## Other Aspects of Human Experience

Pupils are required to relate their topics of study to current affairs. For example:

Church and State: Can a Christian or politician of any religion serve the state effectively? What if the needs of the Church and the state clash? Should politicians remain private about their faith? There are many local examples of religious people involved in political positions.
